102 Vie for 10 National Book Awards

Judges for the National Book Awards have chosen 102 "leading nominees" for the 10 prizes that are assuming an importance for the book industry comparable to that held by the leading Oscar award winners for the movie world.

The nominations, disclosed yesterday by the National Book Committee, represent the preliminary selection by 36 judges of what they consider to have been the most distinguished books by American authors published during 1971. The juries will meet again April 11 to announce the winners of the 10 prizes of \$1,000.

Among the 102 nominees are 5 previous National Book Award winners, all of them novelists --- James Dickey, Norman Mailer, Joyce Carol Oates, Walter Percy and John Updike.

Mailer Competes in 2 Areas

For the second time, Mr. Mailer, who is 48 years old, enjoys the distinction of having been nominated in two categories. His impressionistic account of the Apollo II moon landing, "A Fire on the Moon" (Little, Brown), is a contender for the prize in the sciences, and "The Prisoner of Sex" (Little, Brown), his polemical essay about the Women's Liberation movement, was nominated in the new category of contemporary affairs. In 1969, Mr. Mailer's account of the anti-Vietnam demonstrations in Washington, "The Armies of the Night" carried off the prize for arts and letters and his book "Miami and the Siege of Chicago" had been nominated for history and biography. Mr. Dickey's "Sorties" (Doubleday) was nominated for arts and letters while works of the three other novelists were selected by the fiction panel. They are Miss Oates's "Wonderland" (Vanguard), Mr. Percy's "Love in the Ruins: The Adventures of a Bad Catholic at a Time Near the End of the World" (Farrar, Straus) and Mr. Updike's "Rabbit Redux" (Knopf). The awards will be presented the evening of April 13 at Alice Tully Hall, Lincoln Center, concluding a four-day program of seminars, luncheons and news conferences designed to emphasize the importance of the National Book Awards. The program opens April 10 with a dinner celebrating the 50th anniversary of the P.E.N. Club, at which Pablo Neruda, Chile's Nobel Prize-winning poet, will be the guest speaker.
